City of Glendale 'lights the way' for pedestrian safety

Flashing lights have long been known to attract attention and the City of Glendale is using this principle to benefit pedestrian safety. Two special projects in the city are combining technology and the attention-grabbing nature of flashing lights to provide for greater pedestrian safety --- particularly in school zones.

In some 30 locations throughout the city, pedestrians are assisted by an embedded in-roadway and lighted sign warning system. When activated by a pedestrian at the crosswalk these technologically advanced flashing LED lights outline the crosswalk and appear in the post-mounted pedestrian signs. Studies have indicated that this alert system results in a significant increase in the percentage of drivers yielding



to pedestrians in the crosswalk.

Solar technology has enabled installation of solar-powered flashing beacons at four school crossing locations in the city. One such location is at the intersection of Chevy Chase and Garfield near Muir Elementary School. This busy crosswalk is also protected by the assignment of an ACMS School Crossing Guard three

times a day. The attention-grabbing flashing lights alert drivers to the presence of the crosswalk during periods when students are traveling to and from school.

In addition to using flashing lights to aid pedestrian safety, The City of Glendale is also currently involved in a pilot program testing portable pedestrian crosswalk signage at four locations throughout the city. The signs are put in place by ACMS School Crossing Guards during their shifts and are being studied for effectiveness in contributing to pedestrian safety in school zones.

HOT TIME IN THE CITY



The months of August and September can produce some of the hottest days of the year. Our urban environment, especially the sun-baked streets, makes the temperatures climb even higher. It's important for everyone who works outside to recognize the symptoms of heat exhaustion and the more dangerous condition of heat stroke.

DRY, PALE SKIN WITH NO SWEATING; HOT, RED SKIN THAT LOOKS SUNBURNED; DIZZINESS; WEAKNESS, NAUSEA; SEIZURES OR MOOD CHANGES SUCH AS IRRITABILITY OR CONFUSION are all possible signs of heat-related illness.

Heat exhaustion is primarily caused by dehydration so it is very important to drink plenty of water during periods of hot weather. Also keep in mind that some factors increase your risk of heat stroke. Taking certain medications (check with your pharmacist), having a previous heat-induced illness, and dressing too warmly can all contribute to a dangerous situation.

Heat related illnesses are potentially dangerous. If you notice symptoms call 911 for emergency help immediately.
